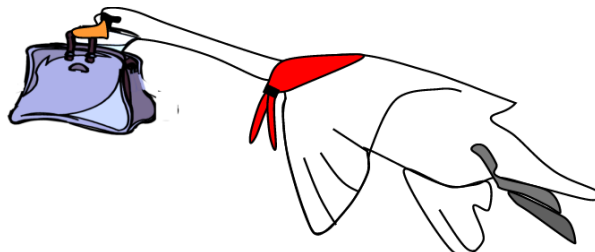

After we had our practice we went to ICANDO in a taxi. We went back in a taxi and we told the taxi driver we had an appointment with the Queen and he was shocked!

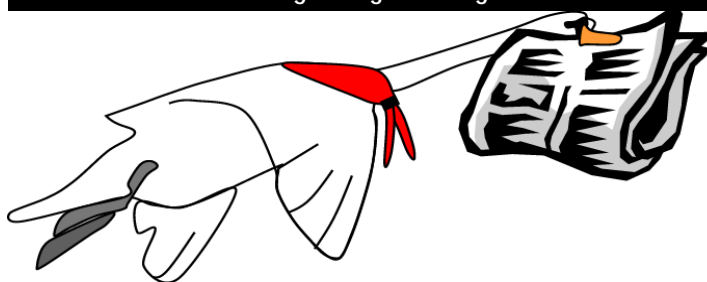

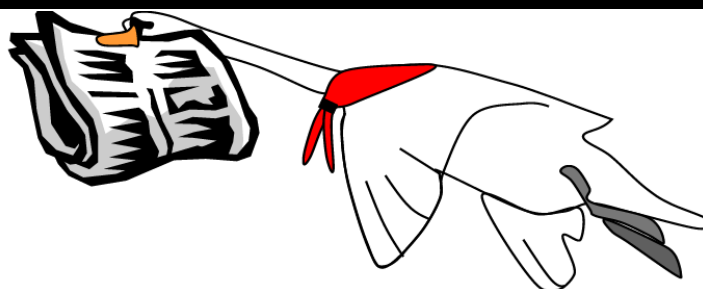


had some items to look at from Ghana such as drums and other items. A very different evening for us- we hope she can come again soon.

## Brand New Unit in Chenies and Chalfont

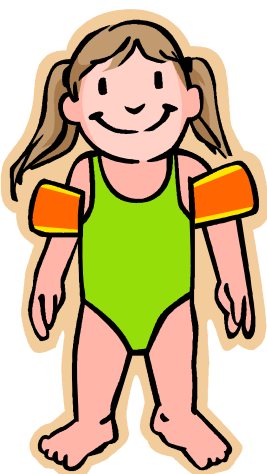

## Denham Brownies are Champions!



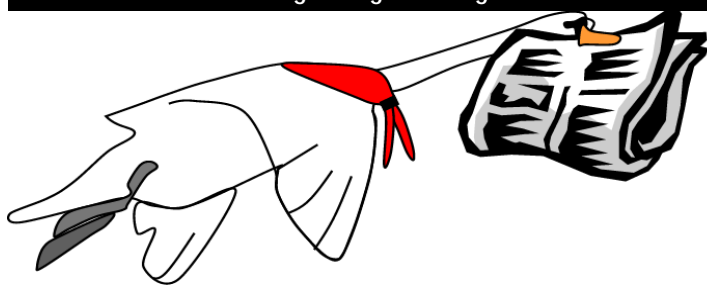

## Tunisia Explored 2008

You'd have to question the sanity of someone who decides towards the end of their time in Senior Section to under take a 160km expedition. This is what the Explorer Belt is - it's a 160km walk over 10 days in teams of about 3 - easy? Well it's more than that too, we choose a major project to study (ours was Cultivation to Cuisine: Traditional crops and food of Tunisia) and were assigned 10 other minor projects.

Whilst we carried a tent and stove in our rucksacks we aimed never to use them - another key part of the Explorer Belt experience is becoming immersed in the local culture, especially by visiting and potentially staying in peoples' homes. This helps us achieve our projects and adds in that extra challenge of communicating with the people we meet. It makes the Belt physically, mentally, intellectually, socially and emotionally challenging.

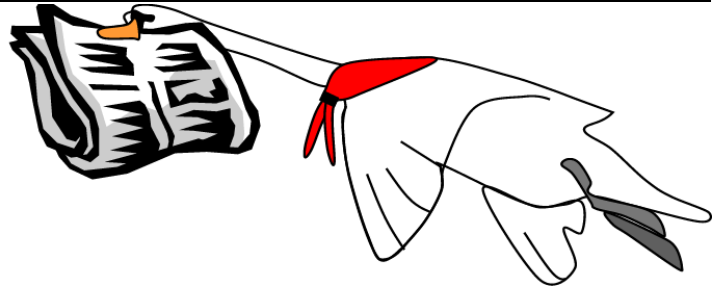
The team I was in was an all Guider team (plus Claire Bennett (Booker Rangers) and Emma Dean (Wales)) - the rest of the expedition teams, bar one member of the organising team, was made up of members of the Scout Association. Although the Explorer Belt is rarely undertaken by Guides, it is open to Senior Section members between 16 and 26.

However being an all-girl, all-guide team walking through Tunisia worked very much in our favour. It gave us a unique insight to the all female worlds that existed, and revealed how women are respected and how much power they hold, within their families and communities. And, whilst the majority of people we met politely implied that we were mad, and then asked where our car was; they were extremely welcoming, and neither the tent or the stove got an airing during our expedition.

## Tunisia Explored 2008

This was partly because it was considered unsuitable for women to sleep outside when it was "so cold" (a mere 25°C, is considered a winters day) - thus we stayed in family rooms, on floors, in offices, at a wedding party and at a Scout hall.

People regularly stopped us at the side of the road to ask what we were doing (backpackers are unheard of in Tunisia). Scouting and Guiding in Tunisia are joint, but boys and girls meet separately. Scouts (Kashefa in Arabic) are extremely well respected and wearing a necker was certainly a conversation starter and provided some reasoning about why we'd chosen to walk 160km. One man once delivered a baguette and two yogurts to us whilst we were sat at the side of the road (with little explanation!). Many of the children we met in villages had never seen western women who weren't on TV. The complete cultural immersion we experienced for the 10 days was almost indescribable and during our stay we made many friends, especially two Scouters from the Island of Djerba, who made us feel part of their group, joined us for one day's walking as well as helping us make contact with the other scout troops as we progressed.

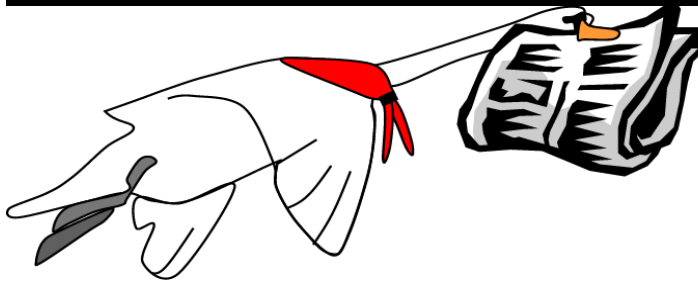
I'd recommend undertaking an Explorer Belt to Senior Section members, they are run by Scout County International Teams, Networks, but also international fellowships. Ours was organised by the UK Arab Scout Fellowship ([www.uk-arabfellowship.org.uk](http://www.uk-arabfellowship.org.uk)).



The final part of our Belt will take place next month in London where the team will present about the expedition for assessment to the organisers, other key assessors, and our supporters, to prove that we have completed our challenges and worked as a team.

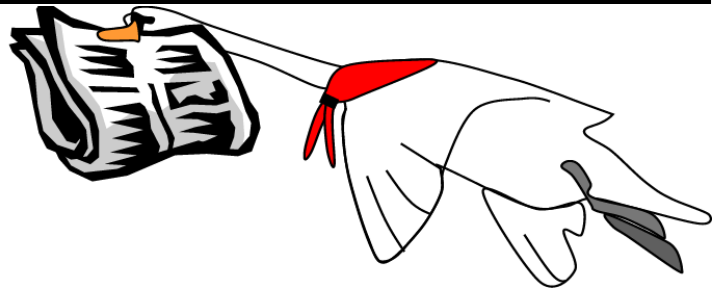

## 15 Years of Entertaining

Every year, 10th Chesham Guides, helped by the Brownies and Rainbows, organise a party for Senior Citizens in Chesham. It's a wonderful way for the girls to interact with older people and our guests really appreciate being waited on and entertained for the afternoon. We've been doing it since 1992, back by popular demand each year, our guests really look forward to coming and we really enjoy having them.



We send out invitations about a month in advance and encourage people to bring a

friend so we generate new guests year on year. Many people need transport and that's probably the biggest logistic, telling guests when they will be collected and ensuring we have enough parents and husbands to help.

On the day, we arrive at Hivings Free Church at noon, put up decorations, set up and lay the tables and fill up the urns. Parents provide all the food and soon our team of Mums is in the kitchen getting ready for the first guests. Although we say the party starts at 2.45pm guests arrive from 2pm ready for a first cup of tea. The Guides meet, greet, take coats, take guests to their seats and get them a drink.

The town Mayor usually comes at this time and mingles.

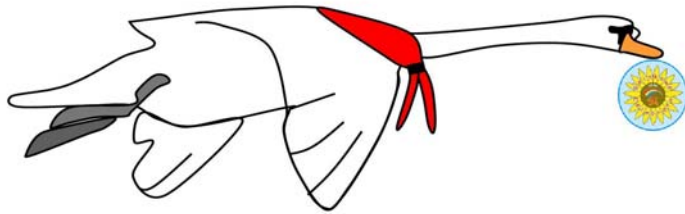
At 2.45pm we have an entertainment item. This year it was an animal quiz as the theme for the main entertainment was animals. Then we sing grace and the Guides become waitresses, each allocated to a table. Large quantities of sandwiches, scones, sausage rolls and cakes are eaten and, of course, the teapots have frequent refills.

We don't have a stage so we have to take down the tables to provide room for the entertaining. Everyone sits round three sides of the church and the Rainbows, Brownies and Guides entertain with playlets, dancing, musical solos and singing. And there are always plenty of opportunities for our guests to join in and sing.

We finish the afternoon with the Rainbow Song, Brownie Bells and Taps and then more careful logistics to ensure our guests get back the right coat and are safely transported home.

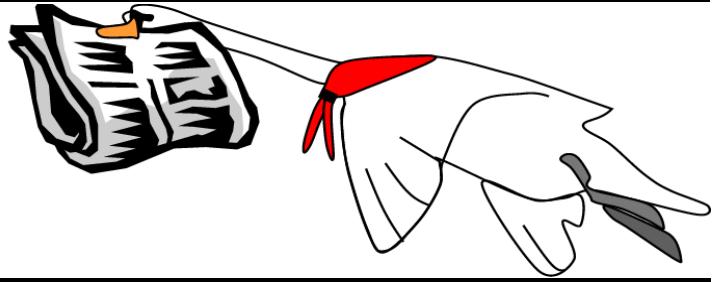

Archives exist to house a record of Guiding and are available for research into our history by members of the movement.

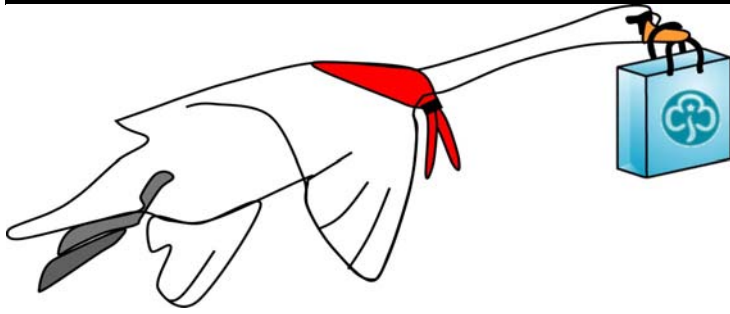
I am always on the look out for items to add to the collection, the older the better. Don't throw anything away, it could be useful to the archives.

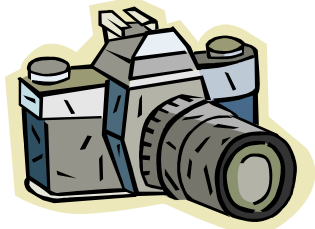
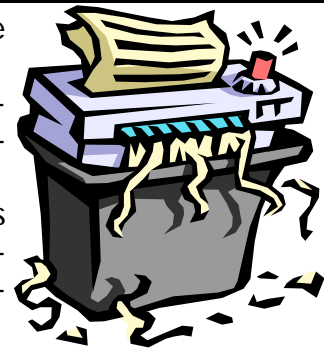
## Some Admin Reminders

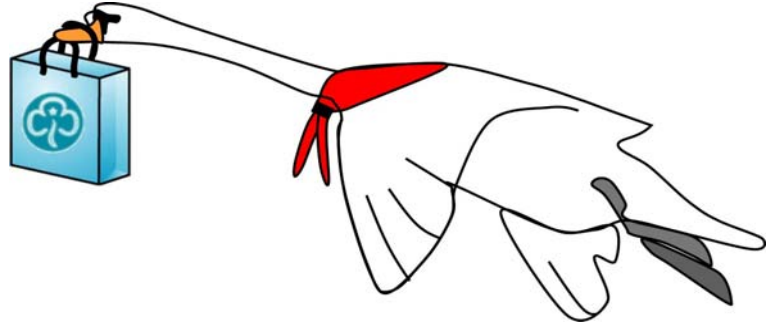

## Funding Opportunity

### Promoting Positive Activities for Young People

#### Fantastic Funding Opportunity for Voluntary Organisations 2008

Youth Focus is pleased to announce that Buckinghamshire County Council Community and Youth Engagement have awarded us a one off grant to set up an Accessing Positive Activities Fund to distribute to voluntary sector projects.

#### Aim of the Fund:

Voluntary youth groups have the opportunity to offer a project or activity that will open up their group to new members and encourage more young people to become involved in the positive activities run within their club or unit.

#### Who can apply?

The Fund is open to groups in the Voluntary and Faith sector who work with young people aged 13 - 19. Successful applicants will run a project that will enable young people to take part in a positive activity. It must be attractive in encouraging other young people who don't usually participate to get involved, in addition to regular club members. At least 75% of the participants need to be in the 13 - 19 age range.

#### How to apply

Applications can be made for up to £500 on a first come first served basis, until the pot of money runs out. We need to distribute the funding as evenly as possible between Youth Focus members so if there is an excess of applications from one of the umbrella organisations, a quota system may have to be applied. #### What sort of projects can the money be used for?

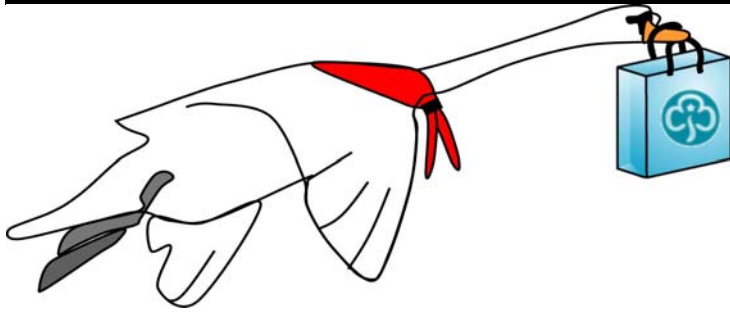
You could use the money to:

- ◆ extend a project that you are planning or already have running.
- ◆ pay for extra space at your venue or pay for additional staff to run an event/workshop e.g. an arts project worker to run a workshop in your usual club time.
- ◆ provide a one-off project e.g. a day of drama, art or sport in the holidays.
- ◆ fund extra resources to put into an ongoing project.
- ◆ take the young people on a trip out to participate in a positive activity e.g. using the climbing wall at Green Park.

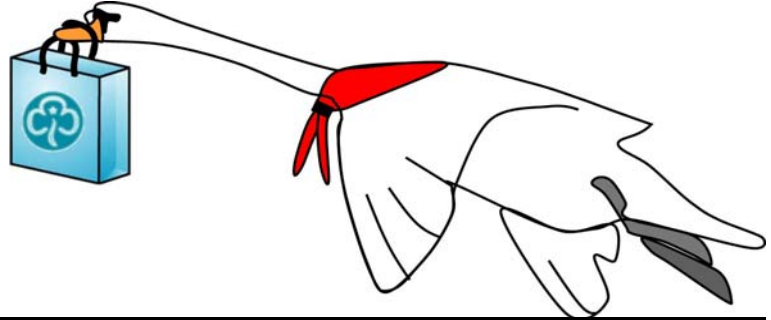

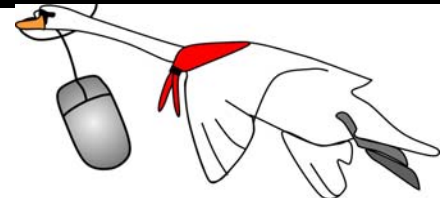

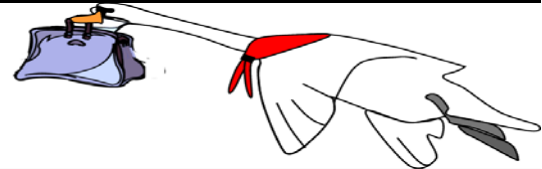
