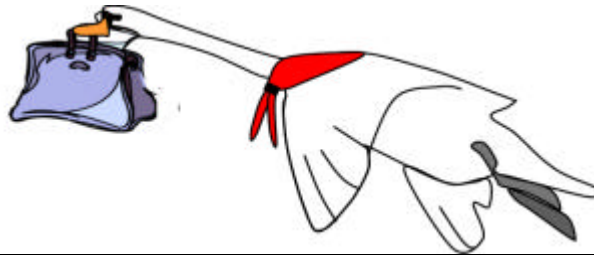

made for the royal selection process to present the official posy to Her Majesty the Queen.

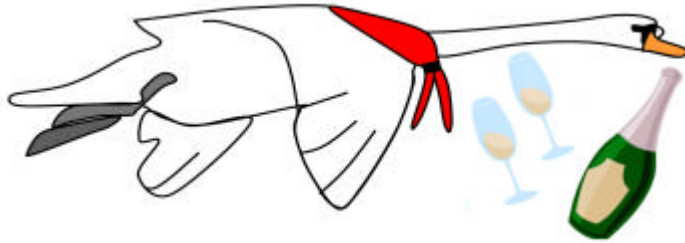

New Year Honours for Olive Mulley

2007 has been a memorable year for Scouting with an immense media coverage of the 100th Year Jamboree on Brownsea Island and in Essex. As readers of the 'Bucks Bulletin' are fully aware, Guiding is equally as big, with world-wide membership. The strength behind these organisations is the 'grass roots' voluntary input by individuals who share a passion for what Scouting/Guiding means and who wish to further it within their local community. The commitment of so many selfless individuals who expect no recognition for their hours of unpaid work is remarkable in today's modern materialistic world. Their ceaseless efforts have resulted in thousands of young people enjoying opportunities which may never have been afforded to them otherwise.

As parents we are so proud when our child's name reaches the top of the waiting list and there is a place available for them to join 'Rainbows'. (That is of course, if there is a Rainbow Unit nearby!) New friendships are formed and new skills are learned. A couple of years on and again, the name hopefully reaches the top of the list and the child is able to join 'Brownies'. At this stage, there is a little more parental input - if you've managed to avoid sewing up until now, your time has run out, because badges are earned and are proudly displayed on your child's sash 'with enormous stitches advertising your total ineptitude!) Throughout, there are opportunities for parents to assist at various functions and with fundraising but it is all very low key thanks to the support of the leaders and their interaction with each other and the bigger guiding 'network'. By the time the child has reached the age to join Guides. Many other extra-curricular opportunities may have presented themselves decisions have to be made as to what the child deems important, as to whether she continues into Guides (subject to places being available!)

Here in Loudwater, we are extremely fortunate to have all the above options available: 1st Loudwater Rainbows, 1st and 2nd Loudwater Brownies and 1st Loudwater Guides. These units have been run by the same dedicated ladies throughout the whole 16 years in which our family has been involved with Guiding, (and for longer) They are always professional, cheerful and totally committed to providing stimulating fun-filled activities for the various age groups of young girls and we are immensely grateful to all of them. Thank you!

The twins have had further opportunities presented to them through Selection Weekends and have been fortunate to visit 'Our Chalet' in Switzerland in 2003 and enjoyed an International Scout Jamboree in Finland in 2004. They have experienced foreign travel, food and culture and made friends with Guides and Scouts from other countries, some of whom they have remained in contact with. We subsequently have 'hosted' three of the Finnish scouts, in return, in 2005. Last year, the girls were fortunate enough to be selected (with seven other Guides from Bucks) to attend the World Scout Jamboree in Essex and to mix with Scouts from all over the World to celebrate their 100th

Anniversary. The funding of these trips at first seemed utterly daunting to me (especially as we had two children attending, both of whom were under age for proper paid work and a limited family budget) but with the support and guidance of various Guide personnel around Bucks, we embarked upon fundraising which spanned a couple of years. This included paper rounds, babysitting, cake sales, bagpacking at Sainsbury's, carol singing to name but a few. Olive supported us and the other girls from her Unit who had gained similar opportunities to travel abroad. We were also grateful to receive donations from the District, the Division and the County funds as well as donations from staunch supporters and friends of Olive's.

Behind the scenes, for decades, Olive has continued with her unstinting fundraising, in which all her Guides assist, delivering Parish, Church and School leaflets/magazine and supporting the Unit with Fundraising Catalogues to name but a couple. That discarded Coke can in the gutter, is pennies in the Unit's Funds once it has been crushed along with its colleagues and carted off to the recycling by Olive and her husband!

I appreciate that there are thousands of Unit Leaders who tirelessly offer similar opportunities and I can only but admire you and thank you all, especially all those of you with whom we have been fortunate enough to meet, and who have helped our girls enjoy and achieve so much. I am unaware of how one can encompass a group 'thank you', but we as a family extend our thanks to everyone for making the Guiding 'family' work as efficiently as it does. Hopefully, as 'Young Leaders', the twins themselves are now able to help continue to support Guiding through their knowledge and experiences.

We had no previous knowledge of nominations for Honours but wanted to express our appreciation to Olive in some way beyond gifts at Christmas and 'thank you' letters. Many of you will know her, quiet, unassuming and hardworking. We, in Loudwater, have the benefit of knowing her family, all of whom are not only dedicated to the Guiding movement but also to the local community. Both her daughters run Brownie Units. Her son and husband are active supporters of all her ventures. They are the sort of family which works 'behind the scenes' and are what helps a community thrive. The Guides are prominent locally because Olive encourages them to assist at community functions i.e. serving hot dogs at the Christmas Eve 'Carols In The Park', running a Guiding Stall at local school and Scout functions etc.

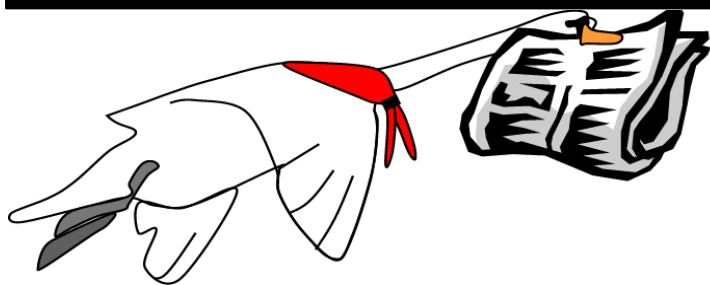
So, that is the history behind our Application and this is an explanation of what it actually represents:

An MBE (Member of the Order of the British Empire) is an award 'for an achievement or service in and to the community of a responsible kind which is outstanding in its field; or a very local 'hands-on' service which stands out as an example to others. In both cases, awards illuminate areas of dedicated service which merit public recognition'.

We felt that Olive fits this criteria and so, with assistance from Sue Dann and others within Guiding, and Chris Hawks representing the local community, we obtained Letters in Support from a variety of people who have either benefited from Olive's efforts over the years, or who have worked alongside her or admired her efforts. We embarked on this in March 2005 and were made aware on receipt of our Application that it may take up to two years for the application to be processed and in that time, no-one must mention it to the Nominee or her family! We are delighted that Olive has been recognised in this way. She represents the spirit of Guiding movement!

A Grand Day Out

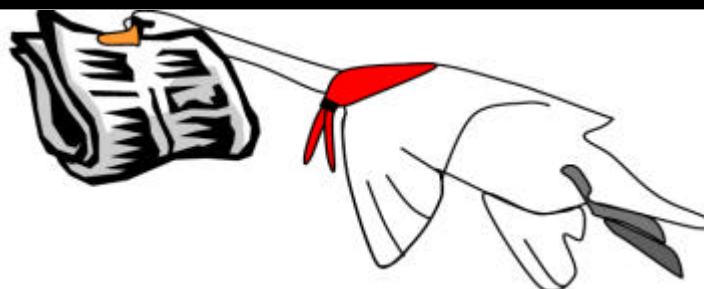

Kandersteg whilst on a 2 week guide holiday to Switzerland this summer.

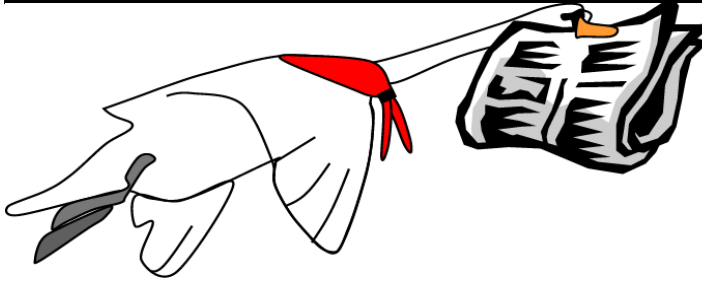

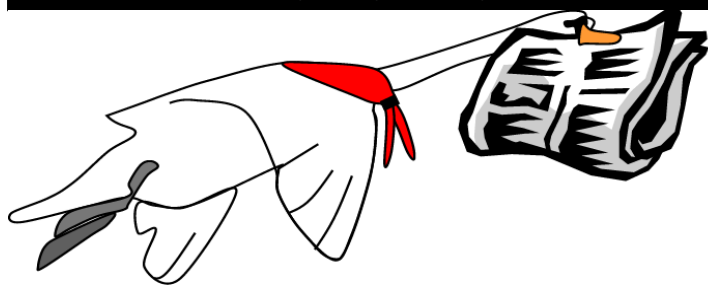
The O2 Arena, London - November

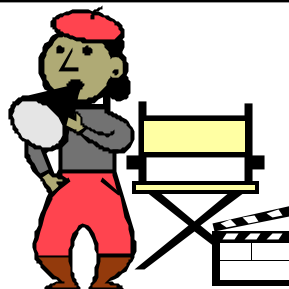

- ◆ Shreak!

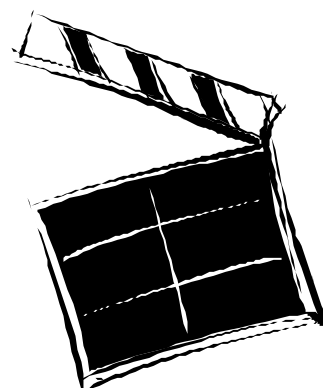
The story of a fairytale giant creature who rescues a princess from imprisonment and marries her.

A traditional tale where a poor girl meets and marries a rich Prince.

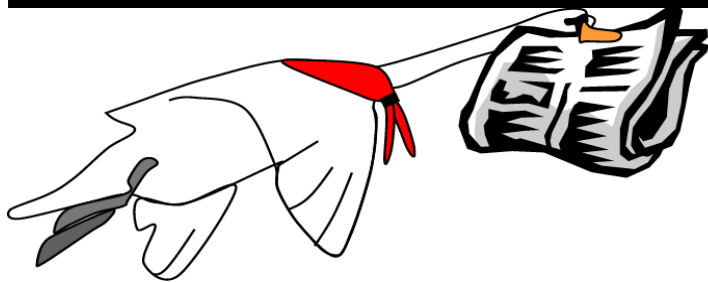
Judging will take into account:

The programme for the next nine days tested us as we were out working in the community which included an old peoples' home, an orphanage and schools for children of construction workers. We swam with the children, gave instructions on general hygiene and 1st Aid. We felt we had seen a bit of real India. We met professional Indian women, learnt some traditional art and embroidery, visited local homes, were told about different faiths and saw a Bollywood film. It was a truly humbling experience.

This took a whole week, at the end of which they were all given their uniform of a beautiful blue sari with a white blouse and pink neckerchief. They then said their promise and were enrolled.

On 23rd February this Guild will celebrate their 60th birthday. There will be a display in Great Missenden Library and we are having a party in the Memorial Hall.

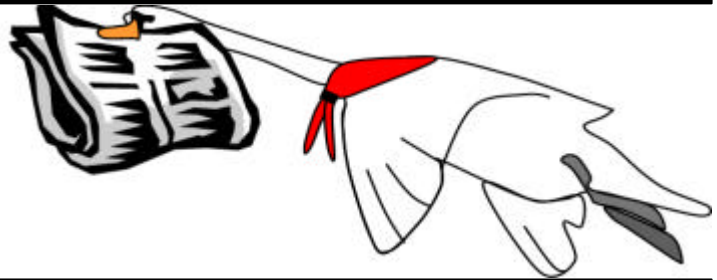

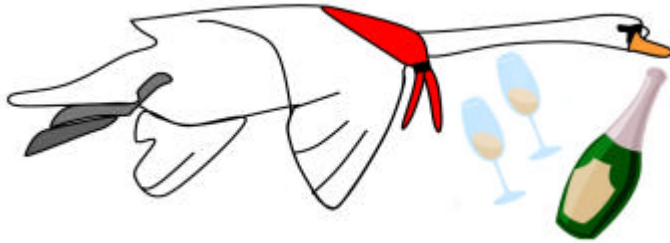
1st Dorney Brownies

Auberge du Chocolat in Gerrards Cross for a practical evening. BUT ... we were not allowed to eat any chocolate on the premise.

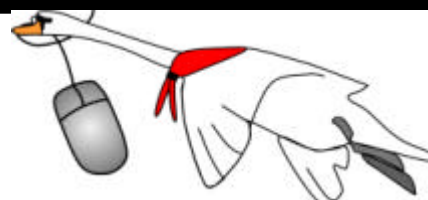
SO ... the following week we had a sleepover and, yes, more chocolate but this time we enjoyed eating it, as you can see from our picture.
